Dear Parents,

We can expect that as we go through life, we make mistakes and do the wrong thing. It is sometimes hard to get students to see that what they did was wrong. They don't always own up and sometimes try to push the blame onto others. The fear of the consequences not only didn't stop them doing the wrong thing; but it also leads them to compound the offence by lying.

Students often have before them regular media reports of citizens in trouble for doing the wrong thing and they hear and read about apologies (of sorts) from drivers to footballers proclaiming that they had done "a silly thing" and regretting the consequences of their act. "Spin doctors" are called in to explain it all away. Rarely do students experience someone admitting that what he or she did was plainly wrong.

The emphasis given to consequences and fear of consequences is not a good way of educating students to do the right thing. A student weeping because his/her parents will find out that he/she has done the wrong thing is weeping about the consequences, not about the wrong-doing.

If and when the fear of consequences dissolves, then students stand in danger of being in a moral vacuum that can lead to wrong doing. Moral education is something that we urgently need in schools and something which can be glossed over if we become fixated on consequences and fear of punishment.
