Day Five

Match Highlights

Adelaide vs. Shepparton - Final

Shepparton won the toss and batted but were unable to get the ideal start in the final as Adelaide struck first and pushed them on to the back foot. Lachlan Ash (38) and James Boyer (21) came together at 3/7 and dug their heels in to consolidate the innings momentarily with a 47 run stand. However, the strong bowling attack of Brad Thompson, Thomas Rooney, Lachlan Camm and Jonah Whitelum didn't allow much latitude and eventually had Shepparton bowled at for 112.

Adelaide took to the task of chasing down the small target with minimum of fuss and behind the efforts of Gavin Regan (59) and Aryan Sareen (21), the South Australians surpassed the small total with the loss of just 4 wickets. Ethan Baxter toiled hard and took 3-18 for Shepparton.

Woodlawn vs. Traralgon

Woodlawn got off to a reasonable start in the playoff for 3rd and 4th and had pushed ahead to be 2-57. A middle order collapse gave Traralgon great hope as the New South Welshmen lost 6-13 and their minimal total looked unimpressive. However, Seth McClelland (25 not out) and Tom Standish compiled a 10th wicket stand of 56 runs to give Woodlawn a total to defend. Liam Little (4-18) and Ewan Williams (3-20) were the pick of the bowlers for Traralgon.

Traralgon's top order again failed to make an impression in the run chase and Jordan Jobling top scored with 19 runs. Fergus Campey was a dominant figure in the bowling stakes to capture 4-18 and help steer Woodlawn to a 61-run victory over Traralgon.

Bunbury vs. Bendigo

Bunbury elected to bat after winning the toss and made good use of their time at the crease. Their top order batsmen all got a start but the main scorers were Beau Luzi (38), Jaxon Pitts (35) and Joshua Trigwell who pushed Bunbury's tally to 204. Luke Stagg was again prominent with the ball and took 4-26 while Chris Cox offered valuable support with 3-28.

Bendigo got away to a steady start and were 0-31 before the wicket carnage started with Jared Carbone and Beau Luzi each taking three wickets. Bendigo lost their first 5 wickets for 20 runs as they began to feel the pressure of chasing a further 153 runs. Chris Cox and Ethan Roberts both reached the 20's but once they were dismissed Bunbury tightened the reigns and dismissed Bendigo for 89 in 30 overs. Carbone had the figures of 3-4 and Luzi took 3-14.

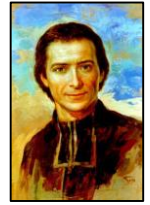
Newcastle vs. Alice Springs

Josiah Butter top scored for Alice Springs with 25 runs but there were few who were able to maintain their presence at the crease long enough to help Alice Springs secure a big score. James Bennett, Jordan Nicolai and Caleb Smith were able to offer minimal support but the wickets continued to fall at regular intervals. William Davis was in fine form with the ball and would capture 4-31 from his 10 overs as Alice Springs could manage just 87 runs. Aidan Galvin also played a part for Newcastle with 3-21.

Despite Newcastle not getting much value from most of their top order batsmen, they were able to surpass the target of 87 runs with the loss of just six wickets. 40 not out by Ethan Ptolemy helped Newcastle reach their target and claim a four wicket victory over Alice Springs.
